Therefore, A.A. is more than a set of principles; it is a society of alcoholics in action. We must carry the message, else we ourselves can wither and those who haven't been given the truth may die. Hence, an A.A. service is anything whatever that helps us to reach a fellow sufferer..."



District 12 General Service is supported by the voluntary contributions of the groups it serves and is guided and directed by the Three Legacies of Recovery, Unity and Service, the guiding principles by which A.A. members recover and by which our Society functions through the principles of A.A.'s <u>Twelve Steps</u>, <u>Twelve Traditions</u> and <u>Twelve Concepts</u>.




Working on the Tenth Step of AA means continuing to do all of the things we have been doing for our recovery so far; continuing to be honest, having trust and faith, and paying attention to our actions and reactions. We have learned to pay attention to how our actions affect others, and when the effects are negative or harmful, promptly stepping forward and taking responsibility for the harm caused and trying to repair it.



TRADITION TEN

LONG FORM:

"No A.A. group or member should ever, in such a way as to implicate A.A., express any opinion on outside controversial issues — particularly those of politics, alcohol reform, or sectarian religion. The Alcoholics Anonymous groups oppose no one. Concerning such matters they can express no views whatever."



Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the AA name ought never be drawn into public controversy

STEP-TRADITION PARALLEL

The relationship of the tenth tradition to the tenth step is this: I can be at peace and avoid outside issues by taking my inventory and not yours. I avoid controversy by taking stands with the attitude of a peacemaker. The tenth concept of service takes the process one step further and specifies what kind of inventory I should be writing about: The responsibilities for which God has given me authority.

The tenth step poses the question, "How can I survive successfully in the world by taking my own inventory and promptly admitting it when I am wrong?" The tenth tradition supplies the answer; "I survive by being a peacemaker with you because I am at peace with myself through my own inventories."

OUTSIDE ISSUES CAN TEAR US APART

What is an outside issue? An outside issue is anything outside of my relationship with God through sobriety.

The tenth tradition is rather clear as it applies to A.A. We have prospered by having no opinion on outside matters and not being drawn into controversy. For instance, A.A. has avoided the outside issues that tore apart the Washingtonians. A.A. has never become crusaders or taken stands on important but outside issues, "particularly those of politics, alcohol reform, or sectarian religion". (See the long form of this tradition)

Bill Wilson differentiates the responsibilities of the A.A. member and the A.A. group in this tradition by saying on p. 177 of the "12 & 12" that the tenth tradition does not "mean that the members of Alcoholics Anonymous, now restored as citizens of the world, are going to back away from their individual responsibilities to act as they see the right upon issues of our time. But when it comes to A.A. as a whole, that's quite a different matter. In this respect, we do not enter into public controversy because we know that our society will perish if it does."

CONCEPT 10

LONG FORM

PRINCIPLE OF THE CONCEPT:

CLARITY

ONE THING YOU NEED TO KNOW:

Clarity of Roles, Responsibility and Authority is Vital

Concept 10 – Every service responsibility should be matched by an equal service authority .

As I write this I'm thinking about a meeting I attend. I've held just about every service responsibility in that meeting and am the longest regular attendee at the meeting. I guess that qualifies me as the meetings "Bleeding Deacon". I currently don't hold a service position there except for greeting and set-up when needed. We have someone who makes sure the literature and book inventories are full. I don't tell them what to get or how much we need. They have the authority to make those decisions. It goes with the responsibility. I don't tell the coffee maker how to do his job. If someone complains, he has the right and authority to make it different. We don't micro-manage those we put into positions of trust. We trust them to make the right decisions. Someday I may learn to not rearrange the literature table every time I walk in the door as it drives the literature person nuts!!

This Concept applies to all levels of service. If we trust someone with a job, teach them how and don't interfere unless we have to.

"Let us always be sure that there is an abundance of final or ultimate authority to correct or to recognize; but let us be equally sure that all of our trusted servants have a clearly defined and adequate authority to do their daily work and to discharge their clear responsibilities.

All of this is fully implied in A.A.'s Tradition Two. Here we see the "Group Conscience" as the ultimate authority and the "Trusted Servant" as the delegated authority. One cannot function without the other. We well know that only by means of careful definitions and mutual respect can we constantly maintain a right and harmonious working balance".
